Blair has served as treasurer of GLHSC for many years. Between his work, his partner and his home, he has found that he no longer has the time to devote to the Club.

Paul, too, has found less time for GLHSC. He spent many hours helping Blair and me with our functions. However, with the many additions to the gays, lesbians and bisexuals being featured on stamps, his collection is taking more of his time. The Club members owe much to Paul and Blair. Not only did they help found the Club, but they were instrumental in getting GLHSC accepted into ATA as Study Unit No. 458. Paul's handbook is the most comprehensive listing of gays, lesbians and bisexuals on stamps worldwide. His collection has won several awards at various stamp shows. It is through this exposure that the stamp collecting community has been relatively accepting of the Club.

Our thanks go to Paul and Blair for their dedication and service to the Club. We

wish them the very best in their future endeavors.

Ed Centeno has also submitted his resignation, effective June 30th. He has been president/secretary since 1986-87. Although the duties were not overwhelming, he has found less and less time to spend on Club matters.

Ed has done much for the Club. He was the guiding force behind last year's Connecticut cancel and this year's Gay Games IV cancel. His main objective was to get as much publicity for the Club as possible. He truly succeeded, in that membership nearly doubled during his tenure.

S GAY GAMES AND CULTURAL FESTIVAL

June 1994 marks the 25th Anniversary of the Stonewall riots. Thanks to the tireless efforts of Ed Centeno, Gay Games IV will have a postmark for the week of the Games.

In June 1969, police raids of gay and lesbian bars were not uncommon. However, for the patrons to fight back, and minorities within the minority to lead the way, was not the common response. The riots lasted nearly three days. They became the birth of the modern gay and lesbian movement.

New York City is host of the Stonewall 25 Celebrations, Gay Games IV and Cultural Festival. The Games will be held from June 18th through the 25th. The official Stonewall 25 celebration will be a march on the United Nations to be held on June 26th. This event will replace the annual gay pride parade.

The cancel to be used for the week of the Games was designed by the staff of Gay Games IV. It is available at the Unity Center at the Games. The US Postal Service will have a booth along with GLHSC. Be sure to stop by the booth to say hello to Ed and other volunteers.

In conjunction with the Games, GLHSC will be selling postcards with the cancel. There will be eight different designs on the postcards. Each design will represent a different sporting venue at the Games. The cards will be in two colors. Below each "stamp" is a brief history of the Games and a reminder that the 1998 Gay Games will be held in Amsterdam, The Netherlands.

The message side of the card will feature the GLHSC logo, along with a brief description of the Club.




GAY GAMES IV & Cultural Festival

ROCK MUSICIAN'S STAMPS DISPLAYED

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Material from the stamp collection of rock musician Freddie Mercury has been placed on display at the gallery of Britain's National Postal Museum in London, England.

Mercury, lead singer and lyricist for the rock group Queen, died November 24, 1991, at age 45, from AIDS-related pneumonia. At the time of his death, his bisexuality was disclosed.

When contacted by Linn's, a philatelic officer at the museum described Mercury's collection as general, with an emphasis on Zanzibar and stamps of British India with Zanzibar overprints. The collection filled three cardboard boxes, each about a cubic foot in size. The collection was obtained at an auction; details of the sale were not immediately available.

According to the museum official, one goal of the display is to encourage the interest of young people in stamp collecting. Mercury was a familiar personality to multitudes of young music fans, achieved stellar popularity in Great Britain and throughout the world.

Mercury was born Frederick Bulsara in Zanzibar, off the coast of East Africa. His family moved to England when he was 12 years old. Along with three other British musicians, Mercury formed the group Queen in 1971.

Queen dominated world music charts for more than a decade with numerous global hits. Among the group's most famous recordings are Another One Bites the Dust, Crazy Little Thing Called Love and Bohemian Rhapsody.

The last song reached the No. 1 chart position in 1976. After Mercury's death

15 years later, the recording was reissued and reached No. 1 again. It was also featured prominently in the 1992 film Wayne's World.

The group also released We Will Rock You/We Are the Champions in 1977. We Will Rock You was eventually adopted as an anthem regularly heard at sporting events all over the world. Collections of the group's recording continue to sell extremely well.

Mercury was memorialized in 1992 with the Romanian pictorial cancel shown here.



At present, the museum plans to display the material from Mercury's philatelic collection for at least the remainder of this year.



RUDOLF NUREYEV: FREEDOM, I DANCE YOUR NAME

On January 6, 1993, complications due to AIDS took Rudolf Nureyev from us. He had left the stage, which he loved dearly, a year earlier.

Nureyev was born on March 17, 1938 on a train bordering Baikal Lake in the then Soviet Union. His life began like a novel. He was born into poverty, with no shoes to go to school. He was a gangling Tartar determined to dance. "My only preoccupation since I was six years old was dancing. Every second of every minute of every day; I only wanted to dance. I have always wanted to be on the stage," he had said.

Nureyev was not recognized as a potential dancer when he first entered school. Most of the other students made fun of him because of his "country" ways and his ethnic background, being a Tartar. When he finally entered ballet school, they resented him for being untrained, yet receiving the attention of his teachers. With much deliberations, he entered the Kirov Theater of Leningrad (St. Petersburg) at the age of 17. Within six years, he was the Director of Dancing for the Opera de Paris. His childhood dream had become reality. Rudolf Nureyev was the "lord of dancing."

Nureyev's secret to his dancing was his style. He had a speed and lightness unlike others of the time. "I wasn't the dancer who jumped the highest, but I found the means to stay in the air longer than others." He was also not one to conform to the rigid confines of the Soviet way of life. His dancing gave him his freedom. This was to guide his life, allowing him to go beyond traditional frontiers.

He was constantly followed by the Soviet secret police. He met with foreigners and refused to become a Communist. His style was different than the official Soviet style. His first public "jumping for freedom" came in 1961 in Paris. While at Le Bourget Airport, he defected to the West.

Once in the West, he quickly learned to adapt to different types of dance with the same style that had earlier brought him fame. He mastered classical ballet, yet he could easily adapt to Balanchine's choreography. He also wanted an equality between the dancers and ballerinas. Too many companies had the male dancers as fixtures on stage to assist the ballerinas.

San Marino issued a series of 3 stamps. One of them represents Rudolf Nureyev in a ballet of Igor Stravinski, "Apollon Musagéte" (1500 lira). George Balanchine did the choreography. Balanchine had said that no one could dance this ballet but Nureyev.



Rudolf Nureyev was one of the greatest dancers of all time. He always had one idea in mind: FREEDOM. And for this man, his freedom was to be like a star in the sky: admired, adulated and solitary.


Germany issued an 80pf stamp for the 100th Anniversary of the death of Peter Tchaikovsky on October 14, 1993. It shows a scene from one of his ballets. Scott No. 1814.

Cuba issued four stamps in honor of Tchaikovsky. The 5c stamp is a portrait of the composer. The 20c value shows a scene from the Swan Lake ballet. The 30c is a statue and the 50c pictures a museum. Scott has given them numbers 3540 - 3543 respectively. The ban on the importation of Cuban stamps into the U.S. remains in place.

The 3rd Annual Lesbian, Gay & Bisexual Parade in Asbury Park, New Jersey will be having a special cancel on June 5. The cancel features an outline of the State of New Jersey with six streamers to the right. Cancel requests should be postmarked by July 5th. Send requests to:

A picture postcard showing the designs of the Blues and Jazz stamps to be issued Sept. 17 was distributed at the post office in Greenville, Mississippi. Greenville is to be the first day of issue city. Ma Rainey and Bessie Smith are among those featured on the postcard.

The British public record office said that it will make Sir Roger Casement's "black diaries" available to the public. The journals are purported to contain intimate details of his sexual encounters with young men. Irish nationalists have insisted that the journals were forgeries. Casement was executed in 1916 for treason. He can be found on two Irish stamps, Scott Nos. 214 and 215.

U.S. Postal Services Approves Special Cancel for Gay & Lesbian Square Dance Convention

The Washington, DC post office has approved the request of the International Association of Gay Square Dance Clubs for a special cancel and station at the organization's annual convention.

The cancel shows a cowboy boot with a triangle containing interlocking squares stitched on the side, the Capitol dome and the legend "11th Annual Gay & Lesbian Square Dance Convention." It will be available Friday, July 1 and Saturday, July 2.



The square dance convention, called Stars & Squares Forever, will be held at the Omni-Shoreham Hotel in Washington. The special station will be held in the vendor exhibit hall. Over 1,100 Gay & Lesbian square dancers are expected to participate. The convention runs from Thursday, June 30 to Sunday, July 3. The International Association of Gay Square Dance Clubs is composed of 47 member clubs from cities all across the U. S., Canada and Australia.

Another Congressional Free Frank for Our Collections?

Recently, the Washington Blade reported that the right-wing Rep. Bob Dornan (R-California), on the floor of the U. S. House of Representatives, claimed that Rep. Steve Gunderson (R-Wisconsin) "has a revolving door on his closet --he's in; he's out." Later in his speech, Dornan noted that Gunderson had recently spoken to a gay political dinner.

As soon as Dornan made his remarks, House leaders stopped debate in order to consult the House parliamentarian. It is considered bad form to openly criticize another House member from the floor. After debate resumed, Dornan asked that his previous remarks be withdrawn from the record. They will not appear in the official proceedings of the House as reported in the Congressional Record.

According to the Blade, Gunderson has never publicly said he is gay. Gunderson was a speaker at a dinner

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AIDS UPDATE

The Russian stamp issued last November is Scott No. 6183.



John Curry, Olympic skater, died of complications from AIDS on April 15th. He won the gold medal at the 1976 Winter Olympics. He can be found on a stamp from Belize.

Nepal has issued a stamp for World AIDS Day on December 1, 1993. Scott No. 521.

Greenland issued a stamp on AIDS research on September 9, 1993. It is Scott No. 261.

St. Thomas and Prince Islands issued a souvenir sheet containing three 300D stamps on July 29, 1992. The sheetlet was for the Olympic Games/Olymphilex '92 in Barcelona. The third stamp on the sheetlet depicts Ervin "Magic" Johnson.

France issued two stamps for their Europa series on April 30, 1994. This year's theme is "Europe and It's Discoveries." The 2,80F stamp commemorates the French co-discovery of the HIV virus. The stamp and the first day cancel depict the HIV virus.

Along with France, Andorra also issued similar stamps for Europa. Andorra has

been issuing two sets of stamps since the 1930's. Both French and Spanish post offices have been in use in Andorra. The 55P. denomination (Spanish) and the 2,80F denomination (French) are the AIDS stamps.

A recent British cancel from the city of Peterborough for AIDS Action Peterborough.

A fifth cancel used for the AIDS Awareness stamp was omitted from page 11 of the last journal. It was the generic cancel used by most cities. Sorry for the inconvenience.

hosted by the Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF) earlier this year. (Apparently the dinner to which Rep. Dornan was referring.) The Blade reported that in his speech at this dinner, Gunderson referred to "Rob and I" sharing a beach house in Rehoboth Beach, Delaware, a resort popular with gays living in the Washington, DC area.

About two years ago, the Washington Post reported that a gay activist attempted to "out" a Wisconsin congressman by throwing a drink in his face at a gay bar in Alexandria, Virginia. The activist had hoped to create an incident that would be reported in press which would reveal the lawmaker's name. The Post did not report the name of the congressman. At the HRCF dinner, Gunderson spoke about press questions about his sexual orientation as "having been outed."

According to the Blade, Gunderson said, "My professional accomplishments stood to become totally irrelevant next to the single question of whether or not I was gay."

So should we add the free frank of Rep. Gunderson to our collections?
